

Wildlife view enhances fishing regardless of success

Solunar tables are interesting science, but results may vary



President's Message By RICHARD BIRKETT

I have a theory that if I see wildlife, it will be a good day for fishing. I think it goes back to my observations that it just worked out that way for the past few decades. It certainly isn't based on science.

My fishing buddies will tell you that we talk about that every time we go out too, and that it seems to work out that way for the most part. Why I started to think about that, I will never know, but it began as a desire to be outdoors and an

ever-increasing appreciation of the beauty of the animals with each trip. Today I always connect fishing to the abundance of wildlife seen whenever I go out.

Many years ago, while I was in high school, I read an Outdoor Life article about John Alden Knight and the

solunar tables. My curiosity was peaked. Could there be an accurate predictor in fishing activity? Who was this guy anyway? I did a little digging to find out more.

John Knight was a banker by trade, who also happened to write 12 books on hunting, fishing, and other outdoor topics. He wrote over 500 magazine articles and had a column found in over 147 newspapers. Fly tyers might be familiar with one particular

pattern, formerly known as The Assassin, later renamed the Mickey Finn. He popularized catch-and-release because of his love for the outdoors. As he said, "One nice thing about fishing – you can always put 'em back."

John developed the solunar tables in 1926, founded on his belief that wildlife activity was based on the phases of the sun and moon and the associated effects. He then translated that into peaks and troughs by longitude and latitude. His fully written work came out in 1936. (Thanks to Catskill Fly Fishing Center & Museum, and Findagrave

for the above information.)

Back then, people either doubted this work or were willing to accept at least the premise. I am sure that has not changed today. The one undeniable fact though is that John loved the outdoors and that started his observation of the variety of wildlife activity found every time he went out. Over time, that led him to have the confidence to write about it.

So, does it work? Let's see: We fished on Oct. 9, 15, 22, and 30. According to the tables for Prichard (83873), the 9th was average, the 15th could be better, the 22nd was average and the 30th could be better. Our fish counts were pretty good on the 9th and 15th, good on the 22nd, and the fishing on the 30th was very slow. There is no real proof, or even an indication, that the tables worked for us. However, I recall that the tables were pretty accurate when we went Yellowtail fishing in Mexico years ago.

I must admit that I have not used these tables since my teens, sometime after I found that they were fallible, but it was interesting to see what went into the tables. We all rely on nature's signs when it comes to fishing. Things such as the phase of the moon have always been part of our possible explanation for the bite being weak or strong. But there are other signs too, like when birds aren't flying or when

animals tend to bed down during the day. So, I guess as I went through life these things stuck with me, and I became the observer I am today, left to wonder what makes it all work.

What I did accept is the effort John put into the sport of fishing and the time he spent sharing the same with others through his writings. It was those articles that appeared in magazines that a teenager read and imagined what it would be like on rivers and streams in the mountains. I

didn't know the Beaverkill then, but I had a perfect picture of what it was like. I found out that the solunar tables might not be perfect, but the information used as its basis was helpful to me in later years. In short, I learned something from Knight!

Today I pay attention to the weather, stream levels, the phase of the moon, wind and temperature predictions, and other things. But I believe that if I see wildlife, it will be a good day. And the more I see, the better it will get. It may

HOOK: Jig hook #8 barbless

BEAD: Slotted tungsten 3/16" (4.6mm)


WEIGHT: Lead-free wire .020

THREAD: Red 6/0

TAIL: Sexi-Floss copper/brown medium **LEGS:** Sexi-Floss copper/brown medium **BODY:** New Age chenille (Halloween)

Tying Steps:

1. Slide the bead on the hook and mount the hook in your vise.



- 3. Start the thread behind the bead and dress the hook to the bend. Make a small bump of thread at the bend of the hook.
- 4. Cut a piece of the Sexi-Floss into three pieces. Use one piece to make the tail. Bend the Sexi-Floss in half and tie it at the bend just in front of the bump you made in step 3. This should splay the tail about 30 degrees.



- 5. Strip 1/8 inch of the fuzzy stuff from the chenille to expose the inner thread. Tie it to the hook shank at the hook bend.
- 6. About 1/8 inch from the tail, tie another section of the Sexi-Floss to the hook shank to make the back legs. Wrap the thread 1/4 inch forward and tie on the last piece of Sexi-Floss to make the front legs. Wrap the thread forward to behind the bead.
- 7. Wrap the chenille two wraps at the bend. Jump the chenille over the back legs and wrap around the hook shank. Wrap the chenille forward to the front legs. Wrap the front legs same as you did the back legs.
- 8. Continue wrapping the chenille up to the bead and tie it down. Snip the excess free.

9. With the thread, wrap several turns to make a "hot spot." Whip finish and add a drop of head cement.

NOTE: This is a very heavy fly for its size. I learned the Pickle last month on the Columbia River, in British Columbia, Canada (see story, page 8). It is designed to sink fast under an indicator. The Pickle is an October Caddis Pupa. It is tied very much like a "Pats Rubber Legs".

IDFG fisheries manager highlights restoration efforts

Fish passage study covers More than 1,000 crossings

We welcomed Mike Thomas. Regional Fisheries Manager, IDFG, to our October meeting. Mike's first presentation to NIFC was an overview of trout management for the Spokane River drainage. The drainage includes the Coeur d'Alene, St. Joe, and St. Maries rivers, as well as Coeur d'Alene Lake.

Also attending our meeting was Andy Dux, who is very familiar to those of us in the club as he has spoken to our group before. Andy and Mike are from the local office in Coeur d'Alene.

Mike's presentation took us through the various waters in his region and highlighted the ongoing and upcoming projects for restoration. Some of these included culvert replacements, working with other agencies and landowners, and the constant snorkel surveys.

The history of our area was included to give an important perspective of progress, starting with the mining that affected so many areas, followed by the restoration of streams and the management of our

local cutthroat populations. An example of this is the St. Joe River fishery where the decline of cutthroat population was priori-

number of fish. He also talked about the study on fish passage throughout the drainage, which started last year and is scheduled to be completed in December. This study covers more than 1,000 crossings. This is an excellent example of a collaboration with the Restoration Partnership and

Our members asked about the increase in smallmouth bass in the lake and the potential for some kind of bounty program to reduce that population. The potential effect on fish populations has not been proven as being directly related to smallmouth bass. Bounty programs might be something to consider if the science supports it.

One question included a request for more enforcement, and Mike agreed. However, Mike's side of IDFG is related to science. not enforcement.

appreciate having game wardens

around to prevent the taking of protected fish, and to help educate others who might not know the law. While everyone would like to see more visibility from that side of IDFG, the limitation on staffing gets in the way. Meanwhile, members of NIFC can help by spreading the word.

We offered to provide additional signage on the North Fork Coeur d'Alene River, but Andy suggested that this may not be as effective as talking with others we see while we are out fishing.

Another suggestion is that we use the CAP (Citizens Against Poaching) hotline at (800) 632-5999. This is a 24 -hour number, which is also printed on the back of all licenses.

We are lucky to have Mike and Andy nearby, and their willingness to present to our club on matters important to us. Thanks guys!



Taking in fall colors on the Columbia

Chuck Leis and I went to Canada to fish Oct. 14 and 15. We had a grand time and caught several fish each day on the Columbia River, upstream of Trail, British Columbia.

The fishing was great, but it was cold. Not cold enough to freeze up the guides on our



rods, but enough to keep us chilled most of the time.

We were using 10-foot, 6-weight rods

with a fly called a "Pickle." (See the Fly of the Month, <u>page 5</u>.) Fishing was different this fall from what we were used to.

Instead of staying in the eddies for fall fishing, we were casting to what are called the "walls" (the banks) with moving water. The fly is heavily weighted and hung under

an indicator about 5 feet.

We were catching upwards of 25 fish a day. They were not all large. I even pulled in several fish measuring 8 to 14 inches – still beautiful and hard fighting.

We did meet

up with an old club member Ron Mamajek. It was good to see him and visit a little.

We are already planning for next year.

Knots to Know by DAVE LONDEREE LEADER-SWIVEL CLINCH



This knot is used to attach a swivel between the leader and tippet. You can ad weight without adding a split shot and keep your fly from twisting and turning.

NOTE: Each month we will show a new knot. Proper knots are very important and need to be tied well. I will pick a knot and have the instructions on the page. If there is a special knot you would like to learn, let me know. I'll do my best to have it for you.

Now I just checked the solunar tables, and it says the fishing activity for that day was "EXCELLENT." Do you think? I wonder if ... no, never mind, I won't even go there!




