


summer.

Binarch trib may play role in restoring native cutthroat

Our January meeting included a superb presentation by Idaho Department of Fish and Game fisheries biologist Rob Ryan on the restoration of Westslope Cutthroat Trout in the

Priest River drainage. Rob walked us through the general background of the species of fish within the area and then zeroed in on specific projects.

Many of our members recall the Priest River Project, and some may be

aware of the Priest River Watershed Group, which is the group that first started in support of the siphon project. Rob talked about the siphon and the need to balance the variety of issues facing this river, ranging

Storm damage changes view on North Fork Cd'A

Greater snowpack needed to guard against low water, high fire danger



President's Message

The one question I hear the most these days is "Have you been fishing lately?" Short answer is, "Yes," but not as much as I want. I guess that many of us would feel the same way too. However, we did get out last week and enjoyed a beautiful day on the water.

The North Fork Coeur d'Alene River is one of my favorite spots. It's taken a beating from the numbers of visitors but it really took a shot in December with high winds

that literally destroyed hundreds of trees. As you can see by the pictures, trees were on top of, or had completely crashed through houses.

We visited the river on Dec. 29, when these photos were taken. Last week the trees and tarps on the roofs were still in place.

While individual trees were laying down along the road, perhaps the most damage took place at a spot near the turnoff to the Prichard Tavern, where there is what appears to be a water pump station. You can see what it used to look like on Google Maps.

Behind the station is a ridge, and it appeared that the wind was so strong that it tore through and down the ridge. All of the trees on the right were knocked down and covered the entire station and surrounding area, including the dirt road leading to the station.

We could barely see the equipment in December, but last week a logging crew came in and removed most of the trees. It surprised us to see the entire mountain cleared behind the

station as the damage was more extensive than we first thought. I apologize for not having an "after" photo showing the current state, but we were shocked and frankly forgot to take a picture. They still have more to do, and trucks were busy all day taking logs, as well as delivering rock and gravel to other homeowners along the river.

Our day last week included three stops where the fishing was slow. But the serenity on the river was something to witness. Despite the storm damage, the water level had continued its gradual drop and the animals were out everywhere. It was absolutely beautiful. We tried streamers and nymphs and finally found some luck at our last stop. There were no other fly fishers that day. There was a young family enjoying a campfire and the dad walked down to the river to see us fish on the other side. He came back a couple times, as if to say he wished he was doing the same thing as us – casting, watching, and landing a few fish. Despite the storm damage and the early runoff, this river continues to be one of the prettiest year-round.

My old adage, or maybe it's a theory, is that when there

is wildlife, it will be a good day fishing. I was afraid that might not come true that day. But thanks to the luck we had on our final stop, it proved to be true once again! All it took is going very small and using an attractor pattern to get some attention.

We continue to escape the snow with only one real storm so far this season. According to Idaho Department of Water Resources, the snowpack for the Spokane and Pend Oreille regions as of Jan. 26 have a water equivalency of 54% and

80% respectively. Some people have said that February could be big, but I have to admit that I'm concerned. We don't need to have early low-water levels and higher fire danger. I'll keep my fingers crossed and hope we have more snow soon!

Fly of the Month: Courtesy of Dave Londeree

SPANISH BULLET (PERDIGON)

HOOK: 60 Degree Barbless Jig #14

BEAD: Slotted Tungsten 3.3 mm (1/8") gold or copper.

THREAD: 8/0

TAIL: Partridge or Coc de Leon 6 barbs +/-

BODY: Thread, Olive (back half), Black (front half)



TYING STEPS:

1. Slide the bead onto the hook, small hole first.
2. Mount the hook in your vise. Pinch the barb if needed.
3. Dress the hook with the Olive thread from the bead to the bend.
4. Pull 6+/- barbs from a feather and tie them at the hook bend to make the tail, keeping it on the top of the hook shank. The tail should be the hook shank in length.
5. Form a tapered body from the hook bend to the back of the bead.
6. Whip finish the Olive thread at the bead and cut the thread at the bead.
7. Start the Black thread behind the bead. Spin your bobbin counterclockwise to flatten the thread. Form the front half of the body making a heavy taper. Whip finish and cut the thread.
8. Coat with UV cement and cure with your UV light. (If you don't have the UV cement, use several light coats of head cement).

Notes:

1. This fly was tied with a size 14 hook. The fly can be tied from size 16 to 10. You will have to use the proper size bead.
2. This is a heavy fly with a fast sink rate. It makes a great dropper or used with indicator.



Knots to Know


NOTE: Each month, we will show a new knot. Proper knots are very important and need to be tied well. I will pick a knot and have the instructions on the page. If there is a special knot you would like to learn, let me know. I'll do my best to have it for you.

DAVY KNOT



The Davy Knot was invented by Davy Wotton, a Welsh fly fisherman, in the 1950s while he was competing for the

Welsh Fly-Fishing Team. The knot is used to attach a fly to the end of a tippet or leader.

Here are some things to know about the Davy Knot:

- Size: The Davy Knot is small and compact, making it a good choice for small flies.
- Ease of use: The Davy Knot is quick and easy to tie.
- Strength: The Davy Knot is strong, with line strength tests rating it at over 85%.
- Tippet material: The Davy Knot uses very little tippet material when tied carefully.
- Friction: The Davy Knot is so small and simple that there is little friction to generate heat, so it can be tightened without lubrication.
- Tag end: The tag end of the Davy Knot should lie against the eye under the knot.
- Double Davy Knot: The Double Davy Knot is derived from the original Davy Knot. The Double Davy Knot is preferred when the wire diameter is larger, as the Davy Knot is more likely to slip in this situation.



from temperature and water quality to management of the species of fish – both native and invasive.

His presentation also included mention of the Fisheries Management Plan for 2025-2030, which includes the Priest River Drainage. While the siphon project has been voted down, there remains the work of finding a better solution, or perhaps several, to help improve water quality.

Upcoming work on Binarch Creek is one way to address a feeder to the Priest River, but there remain further discussions on the potential for other systems.

Additionally, he talked about the varieties of trout within the system. Several of us were surprised to learn



of the migratory habits of fish originating in Pend Oreille and circulating up to Priest River before returning to the lake.

This presentation marked the second of two from IDFG staff. It included several interesting facts and very open discussion on a

variety of projects.

Rob graciously answered our questions, but somehow, despite his professional approach to the science of fishery management, I don't think that Skip Quade will get his two buckets of bull trout after all!

Fork River – a fishery with a complicated past that's steadily improving.

The lower Clark Fork, where Danner guides, benefits from ongoing restoration work by organizations like the Clark Fork Coalition and Trout Unlimited, as well as

cleanup efforts by his father's excavation company.

He'll discuss what it was like to become a business owner at 21, purchasing the outfitting operation and fly shop from the family friends who taught him to fly fish.

Danner also will share what the fishery offers today and why it deserves a second look from anglers who may still think of it as a damaged river.

That’s all for now. See you at this month’s meeting, when we learn about fishing the Clark Fork with Danner Haskins.






